Summary: The Sacramento County Bicycle Advisory Committee has requested a presentation on the City's Bicycle Master Plan and future connections between the City and County. This presentation will give an overview of both.

Funding Source(s): Not applicable.

Background Information: The region's first bike plan was a shared City-County Plan developed in 1977.



Since then, the City developed its own bike plan. The City of Sacramento's most recent Bicycle Master Plan was approved by City Council in August 2016 and then amended in August 2018 to include a prioritized project list.



While there are approximately 420 miles of on and off-street bikeways in the City, the City's Bicycle Master plan includes 273 miles of planned new bikeways with a cost of \$410 million.




Figure 1: City of Sacramento Planned Bikeways




Figure 2: City of Sacramento Bicycle Master Plan Composite Equity Index



The process to identify the process to prioritize projects was developed by identifying criteria that best met the Plan goals to:

- Increase ridership
- Increase safety
- Increase connectivity
- Increase equity

Staff conducted multiple meetings with the Bicycle Advisory Committee (at this time it was still combined City-County) and public engagement focused to those communities less likely to engage in typical city hosted workshop to identify and vet candidate criteria. The outcome of the prioritization process included the criteria shown in Table 2.

After consensus was reached and the prioritization criteria were applied to the planned bikeways, the bikeways were grouped in to short, mid, and long-term categories. Those planned bikeways that best met the Plan goals had the highest scores and are identified as short-term.




Figure 3: City of Sacramento Bicycle Master Plan Project Prioritization Map





Figure 4: City of Sacramento Active Transportation Projects By Phase


Summary: This project will install bike lanes and street lighting along Howe Avenue between Cottage Way and El Camino Avenue. New sidewalk will be installed on the west side of Howe Avenue and a portion of the asphalt concrete path will be replaced in Howe Community Park. The separated path in the park will be widened, made accessible and have lighting. The signal at the Cottage Way and Howe Avenue intersection will be modified to an 8-phase signal with bike detection. The pedestrian signal at Delma Way and Howe Avenue will also be modified. A raised median will be installed in the vicinity of Howe Avenue Elementary which will eliminate left turn ingress and egress at Delma Way and Dawn Way and provide accessibility and safety enhancements. Safe routes to school education and encouragement program will also be implemented.


Funding Source(s): State Active Transportation Program (ATP), Measure A Sales Tax, and Road Fund. The total cost for the project is \$2.9 million.

Background Information: The project is approximately 1,350 linear feet with existing commercial and residential developments. This section of Howe Avenue currently does not have bike lanes or continuous sidewalk. The new bike lanes will connect existing bike lanes on Howe Avenue north of El Camino Avenue to Howe Elementary and to Cottage Way to the south. Continuous bike lanes will be implemented on Cottage Way by converting the existing 4 lane roadway at the intersection with Howe Avenue to 2 through lanes, a left turn pocket, and bike lanes.

The project has obtained environmental clearance. Real Estate acquisitions and final design is in process. Construction is scheduled for Spring of 2022.





Introduction

Project Background

Sacramento County is updating and combining their prior Bicycle and Pedestrian Master Plans into a countywide Active Transportation Plan. Working with Alta Planning + Design, WALKSacramento and DKS, the County seeks to engage the County's environmental justice communities, non-English speaking households, people without internet access, and other hard-to-reach populations to create a plan that makes walking, bicycling and active modes safe and accessible for all.

Objectives

The fundamental objectives of the Public Engagement Plan (PEP) are to:

- Ensure that those with a stake in Sacramento County ATP are identified;
- Identify outreach techniques for engaging these stakeholders;

Outreach Phases, Goals, and Strategies

The public outreach process will have two major phases: the first phase will solicit feedback on existing conditions, key destinations, and community concerns (Task 2), while the second phase will engage the public to provide feedback on the active transportation network analysis (Task 4) and the list and prioritization of recommended projects (Task 5). **Note that the dates for each phase below are draft and subject to change.**

The Upper Westside Specific Plan bikeway plan (March 2020), were presented to the Sacramento County Bicycle Advisory Committee on May 13, 2020. Staff gave an overview of the plan area and described the trails exhibit. An applicant representative, Tim Denham, was present and answered questions. The Committee reviewed and provided comments on the trails exhibit. All members were present. No action was taken.

DISCUSSION SUMMARY

The committee showed support for the Class II bike lanes on the full length of collector roads, such as Radio Road and San Juan Road. A request was made for staff to request from the Office of Planning and Environmental Review an updated trails exhibit as of May 5, 2020 and to forward to the committee. The updated exhibit shows that Class II bike lanes are on the full length of Radio Road and San Juan Road.

The applicant did not propose Class I along the west side of Witter Canal from I-80 to El Centro Road, which is currently an unpaved maintenance road with no public vehicle access. The Committee requested that staff contact RD 1000 to obtain a trail policy, if any, on whether Class I trails can be sited on a levee top, or to request a meeting to discuss the possibility. The Committee supports a Class I trail on the west side of Witter Canal if it can be sited on the levee top, but not at the toe of the levee due to a concern over perception of safety.

If RD 1000 is not willing to allow a trail on the west side of Witter canal, the Committee advises that the County encourages Class I development on the east side of Witter Canal from I-80 to El Centro Road, outside of the Plan Area. The committee discouraged the creation of a trail that leads the user to cross the canal multiple times.

The overall Committee feedback on the plan was positive.
